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Course Description

Each week, students will be given the rare opportunity to speak directly with industry professionals from all walks. Hollywood directors, writers, cinematographers, editors, producers, agents, managers, entertainment lawyers, development executives and others will come to class, discuss their journeys, offer advice, and answer questions. The class will culminate with an industry mixer, where these professionals, along with dozens more, will join the students for a relaxed evening of networking. This is an invaluable opportunity for students to begin to form meaningful relationships that can help them as they transition from student to filmmaker.

Course Goals

The purpose of this class is to introduce the student to working professionals in the Hollywood entertainment industry in a classroom environment, focusing on the following key objectives for the quarter:

1. Students will research the guest speakers' career for the purpose of asking meaningful questions on their profession during the classroom interviews.
2. Students will gain a solid understanding of each guest speakers' particular profession, and how they function in the entertainment industry.
3. Students will network and develop meaningful work relationships with industry professionals, both in the classroom and outside such as the industry mixer and class trips & events.

Class Schedule

Trade Discussions

Each week, two to three students will choose a news article from a trade site (Deadline Hollywood, Hollywood Reporter, Box Office Mojo, etc.) that interests them and give a three-to-five minute presentation at the beginning of class, which will then be opened up for discussion.

Please email me a link to the story the night before the class.

Student Questions

Each week industry professionals will visit the class to discuss their experiences in the entertainment industry. Students should be familiar with the guests' backgrounds before they come in (we will email you a link to their imdb page or resume) and prepare two or three questions to ask. Students will be randomly selected by the Professor interviewing or the guest to ask their questions.

Video Project

During their stay in Los Angeles, students will make a short video (no more than **5 minutes**) of their experiences and impressions of Los Angeles.

The video can be made individually, or with a small group (three students or less) and will be presented to the class on the final night of class.

Cameras and equipment will be supplied to the students by DePaul University.

Course Policies

Attendance

Classroom attendance is MANDATORY. More than one “excused” absence (doctor’s note, Dodgers game, etc) will result in a lowering of grade per each absence.

Deadlines

Strict Adherence to deadlines is expected. Materials presented or posted late will result in a negative grade for the particular assignment.

Online Instructor Evaluation

Evaluations are a way for students to provide valuable feedback regarding their instructor and the course. Detailed feedback will enable the instructor to continuously tailor teaching methods and course content to meet the learning goals of the course and the academic needs of the students. The evaluations are anonymous; the instructor and administration do not track who entered what responses. A program is used to check if the student completed the evaluations, but the evaluation is completely separate from the student’s identity.
