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Course Description

Each week, students will be given the rare opportunity to speak directly with industry professionals from all walks. Hollywood directors, writers, cinematographers, editors, producers, agents, managers, entertainment lawyers, development executives and others will come to class, discuss their journeys, offer advice, and answer questions. The class will culminate with an industry mixer, where these professionals, along with dozens more, will join the students for a relaxed evening of networking. This is an invaluable opportunity for students to begin to form meaningful relationships that can help them as they transition from student to filmmaker.

Course Goals

The purpose of this class is to introduce the student to working professionals in the Hollywood entertainment industry in a classroom environment, focusing on the following key objectives for the quarter:

1. Students will research the guest speakers' career for the purpose of asking meaningful questions on their profession during the classroom interviews.
2. Students will gain a solid understanding of each guest speakers' particular profession, and how they function in the entertainment industry.
3. Students will network and develop meaningful work relationships with industry professionals, both in the classroom and outside such as the industry mixer and class trips & events.

Course Policies

Attendance: Classroom attendance is MANDATORY. More than one “excused” absence (doctor’s note, Dodgers game, etc) will result in a lowering of grade per each absence.

Deadlines: Strict Adherence to deadlines is expected. Materials presented or posted late will result in a negative grade for the particular assignment.

Class Discussion: Student participation in class discussions will be measured in two ways. First, students are highly encouraged to ask questions and offer comments relevant to the day’s topic. Participation allows the instructor to “hear” the student’s voice when grading papers. Secondly, students will be called upon by the instructor to offer comments related to the reading assignments. Students must keep up with the reading to participate in class discussion.

Attitude: A professional and academic attitude is expected throughout this course. Measurable examples of non-academic or unprofessional attitude include but are not limited to: talking to others when the instructor is speaking, mocking another’s opinion, cell phones ringing, emailing, texting or using the internet whether on a phone or computer. If any issues arise a student may be asked to leave the classroom. The professor will work with the Dean of Students Office to navigate such student issues.

Civil Discourse: DePaul University is a community that thrives on open discourse that challenges students, both intellectually and personally, to be [Socially Responsible Leaders](#). It is the expectation that all dialogue in this course is civil and respectful of the dignity of each student.

Class Assignment Details

LA Quarter Trades Discussions

Evaluation:

This assignment is worth 15% of your final grade.

Assignment Description

Each week the Professor will email 2-3 students to choose a news article from the trades (Deadline Hollywood, Hollywood Reporter, Box Office Mojo etc.) that interests them.

The students will then give a 5-minute presentation approximately at the beginning of class and open it up to discussion with the rest of the students and Professor.

Note: Please email the Professor the night before class a link to the story, and a short paragraph as well why you have chosen it for class discussion.

Weekly Filmmaker Questions

Evaluation:

This assignment is worth 20% of your final grade.

Assignment Description

Each week Industry Professionals will visit the LA Quarter class to discuss their experiences and thoughts on the entertainment industry.

The students are to research the guest speakers for the week (ie screen films, research job position, etc) and prepare three questions to ask.

Then during the class, the Professor will randomly call on various students to ask their questions to the guest speakers.

Individual/Small Group Video Project

Evaluation:

This assignment is worth 10% of your final grade.

Assignment Description

During their stay in Los Angeles for the LA Quarter, the student will make a short video (10 minutes or less) of their experiences and impressions of Los Angeles.

The video can be made individually, or with a small group (three students or less) and will be presented to the class on the final night of LA Quarter.

Cameras and equipment will be supplied to the students by DePaul University.

Final Reflection Paper

Evaluation:

This assignment is worth 30% of your final grade.

Assignment Description

The student will write a 2-3 page double space paper on their experiences and thoughts on the LA Quarter. The paper should focus on the numerous filmmakers the students met in class and at events and what they learned from them.

This Paper is due on Week 10 of class and must be posted on COL.
