COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course deals with visualization and cinema literacy skills. Drawing heavily on a wide array of historical examples, the course will examine the many expressive strategies potentially usable in the creation of moving image art forms: image construction and manipulation, editing, composition, sound, narrative, and performance. An emphasis will be placed on storytelling and visual design. In addition to analyzing the works of others, students will also produce their own projects putting theory into practice. **Please Note:** This course teaches concepts rather than technology. Filmmakers will take the concepts learned in DC 110 to better communicate their ideas in Digital Cinema Production I (DC 210) and beyond.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- » ANALYZE how cinematic techniques function to tell a story or convey a theme
- » SYNTHESIZE cinematic techniques in the production of their own creative work
- » IDENTIFY how techniques function in multiple genres and forms
- » CREATE a project from concept to exhibition
- » UTILIZE basic film production language

PREREQUISITES

There are no prerequisites for this course.

REQUIRED TEXT

- » **FILM ART: AN INTRODUCTION** by David Bordwell & Kristin Thompson (ISBN 13: 978-0-07-353510-4) A must read for all filmmakers to help understand the importance and historical significance of the cinematic form.
- » **DESIRE2LEARN** (D2L): Some additional readings and weblinks will be posted on D2L.

REQUIRED SUPPLIES

- » **EXTERNAL HARD DRIVE:** You will need some form of external drive to store your project files on. You will need at least 200gb of free space. The classroom computers have USB & Thunderbolt ports, so your drive should be compliant. I would recommend a Thunderbolt connection, and/or USB 3.0. A USB 2.0 connection will likely not be fast enough to edit the files in this class. If it is an HDD drive, I would recommend it being 7200 rpms. You will use this drive for this class and beyond. *Also, please note, you are responsible for backing up all of your work!*

ASSIGNMENTS/GRADING

» **ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:** 15% (INDIVIDUAL)

You are required to attend class and participate in the day's activities. This active engagement will ensure you get the most from the course. Each class is vital to your early artistic development.

» **READING + LECTURE EXAM:** 25% (INDIVIDUAL)

This test will help reinforce the key elements presented in the lectures and readings.

» **"THE ACTIVITY" SILENT FILM:** 10% (GROUP)

This silent film will portray one person doing an activity from start to finish. (Ex. brushing teeth, juggling, playing pinball, eating an apple etc). This project will help you better understand the use of cinematic language and composition.

» **"THE OBSESSION" PHOTO ROMAN:** 15% (GROUP)

This is a still photo montage film that should portray someone with an obsession i.e. they are infatuated with one single thing. This film will also introduce the power of sound design to help bring your images to "life". This project will help you understand and experience visual and audio design and their contribution to cinematic storytelling.

» **"THE STORY" PREVISUALIZATION PACKET:** 15% (INDIVIDUAL)

This is the previsualization packet for your "The Story" film. This packet will include a logline, a treatment broken down into the three-act structure, a storyboard and shotlist. The storyboard should be constructed with still photographs, be numbered and feature important sound and sfx. The shotlist should directly correlate to the storyboard. *The best previz packets will be chosen to be made into films.*

» **"THE STORY" FILM:** 20% (GROUP)

This short film should tell a complete story without dialogue, driven purely by visual-story telling and intelligent sound design. This film will help you understand and practice with the power of cinematic storytelling and help prepare you for Production 1.

Course Policies as Suggested by the Dean of Students Office

Attendance: Students are expected to attend each class and to remain for the duration. *Coming 15 minutes late or leaving 15 minutes early constitutes an absence for the student.
