DePaul School **Ottawa International Animation Festival**
of Cinematic Arts **Study Abroad - Fall 2017**

Instructors

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Course Description The DePaul study trip to Ottawa is designed for undergraduate and graduate animation students who have an interest in attending the Ottawa International Animation Festival, the largest and most prestigious animation festival in North America. At the festival, students will have the opportunity to see screenings of competition, feature, showcase, and student programs; attend industry events, panels, and talks; and meet animators, critics, teachers, and animation directors from around the world.

Course Overview Students taking the study abroad to Ottawa will have the opportunity to learn about the state of animation worldwide, increase their awareness of the international film festival circuit, and the domestic and international animation industry.

Prior to traveling to Ottawa, students will meet for a series of orientation and preparation sessions with faculty. These sessions will include readings and lectures on the history of animation festivals and of OIAF in particular, and overviews of what to expect and how to get the most out of their festival experience.

Students will also be assigned a topic for a paper, reflecting on an aspect of the festival. These papers may include: interviews with animators, discussions of films and contemporary trends, or reports on industry topics. On returning to Chicago, follow-up sessions will be held, to discuss the experience and evaluate what was learned. Students will give a short presentation on the findings and analysis in their papers.

Participation This class is all about participation! Not only will you be participating in numerous events at the festival, but you will also be discussing the results of your research on animation and personal experiences with your classmates. Sharing our thoughts and perspectives will enrich everyone's experience overall.

Attendance Students are expected to attend the orientation and preparation sessions with faculty. Sessions will be held on Fridays leading up to the departure to Ottawa. All students are required to attend the follow up session after returning from OIAF.

The student is responsible for any lectures or assignments missed. If an assignment is due a week that you are absent, it is your responsibility to make sure it still arrives on time.

No incompletes will be given without documented proof of circumstances beyond your control.

Assignments Assignments must be handed in on time. Assignments turned in late will be reduced one letter grade per day they are late. Written assignments must be typed.
