Course Description

An introduction to the Internet, the World Wide Web, and web development for students with a strong interest in technology. Students will create interactive web pages by writing HTML and CSS and by programming in JavaScript. Topics include the origins of the web, the roles and operations of web browsers and web servers, interacting with web applications through forms, and using style sheets to separate document structure and document formatting. PREREQUISITE(S): NONE.



Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe how Web sites are organized.
- Develop Web pages with a specific purpose.
- Write simple programs.
- Diagnose problems in computer code by tracing program states, predicting output and explaining any discrepancies between predicted output and actual behavior.
- Identify difficulties and limitations of using computer technology for solving problems.

About our Course Modality

Grading Breakdown

1. **Professionalism (10%)** – Polite, professional conduct, including adherence to masking and other class safety policies is assumed of everyone.
2. **Homework (30%)** – These homework assignments are designed to provide hands-on exposure to the course concepts and ensure students are able to translate requirements into solutions. Late homework is accepted with some stipulations, noted in a subsequent section
3. **Online Quizzes (30%)** - These are short quizzes to ensure you understand the basic terms and concepts covered each week. You can take each quiz an unlimited number of times during the week it's assigned. The highest grade achieved before the due date will be counted, but no late quizzes will ever be accepted. After the due date, you can use quizzes to prepare for the final exam.
4. **Final Exam (30%)** – A comprehensive examination of the course material, administered during official Final Exam week, in person.



Schedule, Quiz, Assignment, Exam Information

Unless otherwise noted, all assignments and quizzes will be submitted or completed within D2L, and are due by 11:59pm, Sunday night, of the week they are assigned. Each week begins on Monday. The lowest quiz and assignment scores will be dropped. The final exam is administered in person during finals week. A score of below 50% on the final exam cannot result in a course letter grade above a C-.

- A score of below 50% on the final exam may require a consultation with the instructor in which you will be required to explain your code from assignments
- A score of below 40% on the final exam cannot result in a course letter grade above a D.
- Not taking the final exam will result in a failing grade for the course.



Late Work & Absences

- No late quizzes will ever be accepted. Late homework will be assessed leniently if the tardiness is nominal (e.g., a few hours, less than a day), but 1/3 of a grade will be deducted for each subsequent day late. This aligns with recommended policies outlining the handling of late work.
