Prerequisite: NET 460 and NET 463

Introduction to the design and management of data networks for the enterprise environment. Network design topics include physical design, logical design, LAN, WAN, and experimental design. Network management topics include switch, router, and firewall configuration, including SNMP configuration, performance measurement, and network trouble shooting. Students will have many hands-on lab exercises to strengthen their learning of network concepts.

Required coursework components and their contribution to the final grade will be:

- a) 2 homework assignments (20%)
- b) 4 lab exercises (50%)
- c) Physical Design Project (Project A) (15%)
- d) Logical Design Project (Project B) (15%)

Further details on each assignment will be distributed in class. Assignments received late will be penalized as follows: up to 1 day late is 5% penalty; 1 - 2 days late is 10% penalty, 2 – 3 days late is 15% penalty; 3 – 7 days is 20% penalty. For Labs and Projects, submission more than 1 week late results in a 30% penalty. For Homeworks, submission more than 1 week late results in a grade of 20%. Although students may discuss general course principles, all assignments must be completed individually and duplicate work will receive no credit for either party. I expect all students to read and understand DePaul's policies on Academic Integrity and Plagiarism (see below).

Grade scale will be: A = 90%-100%, A- = 88%-90%, B+ = 86%-88%, B = 80%-86%, B- = 78%-80%, C+ = 76%-78%, C = 70%-76%, C- = 65%-70%, D = 60%-65%, F = 0-60%. Grade scale may be changed to the students' advantage.
