Summary of the course

In this introductory class, students will be exposed to the aesthetics and practical applications of sound design for cinema. Students will view film and video clips demonstrating various design elements of sound, learn to critically analyze and discuss these elements and learn the basic functions of PRO TOOLS software, which students will utilize with required sound and editing projects. Sound design analysis papers will be assigned throughout the quarter as well as sound editing projects using Pro Tools. Students will take written MIDTERM and FINAL exams, which will be based on terms, concepts and assigned reading.

Materials/Equipment

D.C. majors should have their own external FireWire 800 drive for their project work for this and other DC classes. The University cannot guarantee that media or projects left on lab computers will be safely maintained. Non-majors taking DC 215 should have at least an 8 GB flash drive to store their audio projects. *DO NOT WORK OFF OF YOUR EXTERNAL DRIVES!*
