Topics in Digital Cinema Syllabus

Time, Space, and Memory

Summary

In the haunting and enigmatic film essay *Sans Soleil*, director Chris Marker utilizes a passage from TS Eliot's poem *Ash Wednesday* to encapsulate the foundation of his personal cinematic explorations:

“Because I know that time is always time
And place is always and only place
And what is actual is actual for only one time
And only for one place.”

For Marker, the apparatus of cinematic expression and, in a much grander sense, humanity's ontological mobius strip swirl at the intersection of Time, Space, and Memory. Our course will follow in the footsteps of Eliot, Marker, and many other philosophers, thinkers, and filmmakers by exploring the various ways these three elements affect our consciousness. In particular, we will seek to develop a more profound understanding of various ontological theories in the multiverse of Cinema. Practically speaking, it will be our goal to analyze the ways in which a diverse selection of filmmakers grapple with the elements of Time, Space, and Memory within their particular modes and styles of creation. Simultaneously, we will look inward into how the experiential aspects of Cinema in turn affect our own individual and collective relationships with the question of Being.
