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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an animation production class consisting of lectures, demonstrations and assignments culminating in the creation of a final project that combines more than one animation technique. Students will complete the assignments and final project using mixed media with the choice of animation techniques, content and form left to the individual or group. Some topics covered in this class will be pixilation, rotoscoping, and creative use of green screen, among others.

A basic knowledge of After Effects is encouraged.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

- To work in a studio environment, where students and instructor share their knowledge and impressions
- To explore different types of animation through class assignments
- To discuss each other's work in meaningful, thoughtful and yet critical ways
- To sharpen your creative skills and challenge yourselves as animators
- To explore the expected and unexpected results of creating hybrid animation

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to attend every session and arrive prepared for the class at the indicated start time. Since this class meets only once a week, students are not expected to exceed more than one unexcused absence. A second unexcused absence will result in the lowering of your final grade one full letter. Any student missing three unexcused classes will be given a grade of "F" for the semester. Contact me before class if you are unable to attend. Being late to class two times counts as one absence.

*You are responsible for any missed lectures and assignments. If you miss a class, it is still your responsibility to turn in the assignment on time. We have very tight deadlines that are in place for the timely completion of your film.
