

GD341 **BOOKBINDING WORKSHOP**

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course covering the basic principles of hand bookbinding including theories of book structure, review of paper information and bookbinding materials. The class is a mixture of demonstrations and practical exercises, and each student will produce a variety of books and structures.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

This hands-on workshop introduces bookbinding basics and slowly builds on these structures, encouraging students to experiment and explore structural modifications, as well as understand the relationship between book structure and content. Impeccable craft and attention to detail are emphasized. In order for you to complete this course successfully, to finish all the projects in a professional and meaningful manner, and to fulfill the goals set for each project, it is important that you:

- Work as hard as you can and to the best of your abilities
- Be present every day we meet - demos are given almost every class meeting, and will not be repeated
- Be prepared with research, supplies and assignments required - coming to class unprepared is unacceptable

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance is **MANDATORY** and is taken at the very beginning of each session. To be considered present, you must be in class at the time attendance is taken and remain for the entire length of class. If you are late, you must sign the late list or you will be considered absent instead of late. It is your responsibility to make sure you are on the late list.

2 absences = final grade dropped 1 letter

3 absences = fail the class

3 times late = 1 absence

Professional practices are required. Students are expected to actively participate by:

- Producing and showing work.
- Actively and critically engaging in all classroom discussions and critiques.
- Completing all assigned readings and writings as specified and on time.
- Completing all assignments on time.

EXCUSED ABSENCE

In order to petition for an excused absence, students who miss class due to illness or significant personal circumstances should complete the Absence Notification process through the Dean of Students office. LATE WORK

Punctuality is integral to a successful design career. So, too is turning in your work on time in this class.

- Late work is only accepted one class beyond the due date but will receive a full letter grade deduction.
- Beyond one class late, the assignment will not be accepted and the grade given is an F.
- Only work turned in on time will receive comments and feedback.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Each week you will be introduced to bookbinding vocabulary and history, in addition to various book structures. I will also be conducting weekly demos, followed by in-class work time. Each structure builds on the next and books will increase in complexity throughout the course of the class. It is imperative that you come to every class and arrive on time with all supplies, as it is easy to fall behind with this schedule. There will be a mid-term quiz on history and vocabulary and our final critique will be relatively free-form with individual critique sheets on which you may leave feedback for your peers.

CLASS DISCUSSIONS AND CRITIQUES

Given the nature of this class, we'll be having discussions and lectures, in addition to weekly critiques. You are expected to participate in these exchanges in a professional manner. Participation in critiques and discussions is not optional and is a percentage of your final grade. You are expected to comment on your peers' work, as well as offer your work for feedback. When discussing someone else's work, treat them with respect. When someone else is talking about your work, don't take it personally. Attendance on critique days is mandatory. If you have uploaded your project to D2L on time, yet fail to attend class on critique day, your project will be lowered by one letter grade.

INCOMPLETE

An incomplete grade is a special, temporary grade that may be assigned by an instructor when unforeseeable circumstances prevent a student from completing course requirements by the end of the term and when otherwise the student had a record of satisfactory progress in the course. CDM policy requires the student to initiate the request for incomplete grade before the end of the term in which the course is taken. Prior to submitting the incomplete request, the student must discuss the circumstances with the instructor. Students may initiate the incomplete request process in MyCDM.

- All incomplete requests must be approved by the instructor of the course and a CDM Associate Dean. Only exceptional cases will receive such approval.
- If approved, students are required to complete all remaining course requirement independently in consultation with the instructor by the deadline indicated on the incomplete request form.
- By default, an incomplete grade will automatically change to a grade of F after two quarters have elapsed (excluding summer) unless another grade is recorded by the instructor
