

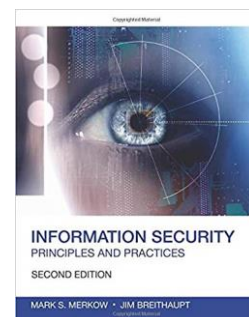

Course Description

This course is a survey of the fundamental elements of computer security and information assurance. Topics may include confidentiality, integrity, and availability; security policies; authentication; access control; risk management; threat and vulnerability assessment; common attack/defense methods; ethical issues.

- Understand and contextualize the principles of information security in complex systems and organizations
- Understand, implement and develop cybersecurity controls, security policies, procedures, and programs
- Perform threat, vulnerability and risk assessments
- Plan a security awareness, training and education activity
- Respond in face of new cybersecurity exploits, campaigns, and latest challenges
- Think critically about role of a cybersecurity expert
- Think critically about broader set of factors affecting the information security management

Assignments

- **Exams:**

- Both mid-term and final exam will be closed book, closed notes.
- The exams will include materials from both the textbook and from the topics covered in the lectures. Some of the lecture materials may not be found in the book. Therefore, it is very important to attend class regularly.
- Exams will be in the form of multiple choice and True/False questions.
- Instructor reserves the right to assign seating for test periods.
- Students are required to take tests at the scheduled time.
- There will be NO MAKEUP EXAM. If you miss the test without a valid excuse, then your grade on that will be zero. If you miss the mid-term test with a valid excuse and provide proper documentation along with the "Student Absence Notification Form" to the instructor, your final exam grade will be used as the grade for the missed exam. - All assignments are due by 11:59 p.m. on the date specified in the course schedule. Assignments are considered on time only if they are submitted on the due date as per the submission guidelines.
- Late work is **not** accepted. You should plan beforehand properly. No excuses will be accepted. Please do NOT wait for the last minute to deliver your assignments and DO plan for possible computer or network problems.
- Hand-written work will be refused and will earn no credit.
- For individual or group deliverables, any instance of copying, cheating or plagiarism will be penalized. Students (or groups) handing in similar work will both receive a 0 in the assignment and will face disciplinary actions.

- **Quizzes:**

- You will have four quizzes which will be conducted online in D2L.
- All the quizzes are individual work.
- All quizzes will be open 12:01 a.m. and are due by 11:59 p.m. on the date specified in the course schedule.
- You have five questions per chapter and two attempts for each quiz.
- If you miss a quiz, there will be no makeups—no exceptions.

Extra Credit Opportunities

- **Participation:**

Students are highly encouraged to ask questions and offer comments relevant to the day's topic. Participation allows the instructor to "hear" the student's voice when grading papers. Participation grade reflects the effort students put into the class by participating in the in-class and online discussions. Your class participation grade will depend on the substantive contributions and insights you bring to the discussion.

In order to have an effective in-class communication, a web-based application (named Socrative) will be used to conduct class discussions and reviews. Students can use either of the following options to connect to the class discussion board: (1) Install student version of Socrative app on their phone (2) Use any web browser to connect to socrative.com using laptops or tablets. This application is free, and there is no cost associated with it for students. Additional information will be provided by the instructor.

If you miss a participation assignment, there will be no makeups—no exceptions.

Winners of the in-class competition(s) and individuals submitting the best group project will receive an award in the form of extra credit.
