Summary of the course

This course is an introduction to sound editing and sound design. The course examines the place of sound in cinema, both artistic and technological. The course will cover the basics of sound, microphones, and analogue-to-digital conversion. Lectures, readings, and film clips will be used to illustrate the language of film sound, as practiced by film directors, sound designers, and editors. Students will learn to edit sound assignments with Pro Tools.

Materials/Equipment

Students need an external hard drive with a USB 3.0 interface. A minimum of 50 GB is recommended. The University cannot guarantee that media or projects left on lab computers will be safely maintained. **DO NOT WORK OFF OF YOUR EXTERNAL DRIVES!**
