DC 301-501: Writing the Feature Screenplay

Description

This course focuses on completing the first draft of a feature length screenplay or original half-hour or one-hour TV pilot script. Emphasis will be placed on a foundation of character, structure, plot, and theme to bring the writer's vetted concept to fruition. The lectures, in-class workshops, and aggressive page deadlines are designed to culminate in a spec screenplay that showcases voice and command of screenwriting conventions. This feature length screenplay should be revised and polished in DC 303. PREREQUISITE(S): DC 300

Course Outcomes

Students will complete either:

- The first draft of a feature-length screenplay (minimum 90 pages)
- The first draft of a half-hour TV pilot script (minimum 25 pages)
- The first draft of an hour-long TV pilot script (minimum 50 pages)

Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- demonstrate the ability to write at a professional pace
- write visceral and visual scenes that demonstrate a clear and unique voice
- create three-dimensional characters with unique voices and clear motivations
- apply established narrative techniques to scenes, sequences, and acts
- evaluate the work of their peers and formulate helpful feedback

Screenwriting Software

You will be required to use screenwriting software. Final Draft is strongly recommended for those with a serious career focus on screenwriting, producing,

and/or directing. The software is \$99 with a student discount at: <http://www.finaldraft.com/edu>. Course Management

The class will be divided into three groups (A, B, C). Every third week, each group's members will be responsible for presenting **2 sequences** (approximately 20-30 pages) for in-class workshopping. For those writing TV scripts, 2 acts unless otherwise indicated (approximately 15-20 pages).

Each student in that week's group will select other students as 'actors' for a table reading of the writer's pages.

NOTE: PREPARE YOUR CAST LIST BEFORE YOU COME TO CLASS.

Students are responsible for uploading writing assignments to their D2L Dropbox. This must be done by class time when they are scheduled to read. **Format: PDF.**

Instructor feedback will consist of written and oral comments in class. In the event we do not get to a student's pages in class or they miss a class with an excused absence, we will set a time for the student to come to the instructor's office for a one-on-one session: The student will read their pages aloud and the instructor will provide feedback at that time.

All written assignments must be typed with pages numbered and proper format. Writing assignments are due by **Tuesday 5PM**. Upload to the appropriate Discussion and Submissions forum.

TV writers will also need to create a Pitch Deck for presentation in Weeks 8-10.

I will schedule one-on-one meetings in my office with each student during Weeks 5 (Group A), 6 (Group B), and 7 (Group C).

Feedback is an essential part of the writing process. We must respect each other, our collaboration, and the work at hand. Be truthful, but sensitive when giving notes. Be prepared to solve problems instead of just pointing them out.

Creative Subject Matter

As this is a creative writing course, controversial subject matter may enter into the conversation. Students should expect to read, hear, and participate in discussions about some stories which include varied subject matter including sex, drugs, alcohol, violence, politics, religion, and so forth. Students have the right to express themselves artistically in their writing and address challenging issues.

If you become uncomfortable with a conversation for personal reasons, you may be excused for the remainder of that class without penalty. Inclusion of individuals from the class, or direct personal attacks on members of the class will not be tolerated in course material. If you feel you are being individually targeted by material written or discussed in class, please inform the instructor as soon as possible.

Decorum and Civil Discourse
