### **Course Description:**

Advanced concepts and techniques in picture editing for directors, such as re-directing, re-writing, pace, tone and rhythm, are taught in lecture and workshop. These concepts and techniques will be applied to the editing phase of MFA Cinema thesis films, culminating in picture lock.

- Recognize and correct problems with pacing, tone, and rhythm
- Create an effective sound design using temp sound effects and music
- Evaluate the significance of different editorial decisions

## Assignments:
