Course Description

Students will gain a deeper understanding of the Hollywood film industry through inclass meetings with industry professionals from various disciplines. These industry professionals will help to illuminate, through personal accounts, the expectations and responsibilities of a variety of jobs throughout the industry. Note: Students must be participating in the DePaul LA program to be eligible to enroll.

Course Goals

- Expose students to professionals from different disciplines to help illuminate the expectations of those roles.
- Illustrate for students numerous inroads to employment in the film industry.
- Expose students to various successful methodologies in the same fields or disciplines.
- Empower students to be brave and focused by demystifying barriers to entry.

Learning Outcomes

(Upon successful completion of this course:)

- Students will be able to identify and understand the responsibilities of various jobs/ roles in the film industry as well as the expectations of people successful in those roles.
- Students will develop a better understanding of the relationship between filmmakers, production companies, and studios.
- Students will gain a deeper understanding of how films are pitched, developed, greenlit, and released.
