Course Description

Advanced study in screenwriting focusing on a specific genre each quarter such as: Science Fiction, Film Noir, Comedy, Action-Adventure, Nonfiction, etc. May be repeated for credit.

Course Outcomes

Evaluate a produced script in terms of the elements that are needed by an actor and write or rework scripts and/or scenes with these elements now in place.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- Define dramatic writing elements needed by actors in a script
- Analyze how these elements are used by actors to bring life to their work
- Develop and apply tools to use these elements in their own creative character work
- Evaluate the work of their peers and formulate helpful feedback
