→ Course Description

Students will gain a deep understanding of the history and foundation of the film industry through behind-the-scenes access to working studios, historical readings and discussions of the material, and the unique opportunity to have access to the Warner Brothers Archives, the largest single studio collection in the world, housing all of the WB materials from 1918 (the release of the studio's first feature film) through 1968 (when the studio was sold to Seven Arts).

→ Course Goals

The purpose of this class is to expand the student's knowledge of the history and evolution of cinema through the following key objectives:

- Students will identify key milestones in film history and culture and locate their importance to cinema at large.
- Students will gain understanding of the origins of filmed entertainment by interacting with historic Hollywood studios and production facilities.
- Students will critically assess films from the early days of cinema.

→ Assignment Details

All written assignments should be at least 500 words (approximately two pages), double spaced, one inch margins, 12 point Times New Roman font

Studio Tour Reaction (20% of final grade)

Students will write a reaction paper inspired by one of the studio lot tours. Included should be impressions of the tour, one specific person, film or event you learned about during the studio tour and why the observation resonated with you.

Viewing Reaction (20% of final grade)

Students must write a reaction paper to one of the following films: *Sunset Blvd*, *Singin' In the Rain*, *The Day of the Locust*, *The Bad and the Beautiful*, *A Star is Born* (1927, 1954 or 1976), *The Player*, *Barton Fink*. **What sort of commentary do these fictional representations of Hollywood provide? Do they support a myth of what Hollywood can be, or attempt to destroy it?**

Group Presentation (20% of final grade)

Students will break into groups of three and develop a 10 minute visual presentation briefly summarizing and analyzing one of the films listed below. **What was the cinematic landscape/context at the time the film was made? Does the story reflect elements of our cultural beliefs at the time or make statements about a specific moment in history? Why do you think the film is considered historically/creatively “important?”**
