Course Description

This class is an introduction to the uses and practical applications of sound for multimedia. Students will study various uses of sound and music on the Internet from creative to professional websites. Using free or inexpensive hardware and software, students will learn to create and edit podcasts and attach audio files to programs and web pages such as Facebook, iTunes, Keynote, PowerPoint and other sites. The course will cover both Mac and PC applications so all students will be able to work on projects from their home computers. The course will also cover current legalities of digital media.

PREREQUISITE(S): None

Domain Description

DC 113: Audio Podcasting & Other Media is included in the Liberal Studies program as a course with credit in the Arts and Literature domain. Courses in the Arts and Literature domain ask students to extend their knowledge and experience of the arts by developing their critical and reflective abilities. In these courses, students interpret and analyze particular creative works, investigate the relations of form and meaning and through critical and/or creative activity to come to experience art with greater openness, insight, and enjoyment. These courses focus on works of literature, art, theatre, or music as such, though the process of analysis may also include social and cultural issues. Students who take course in this domain choose three courses from such choices as literature, the visual arts, media arts, music, and theater. No more than two courses can be chosen from one department or program.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of DC 113, students will be able to:

- Assess the strengths and weaknesses of various podcasts in terms of its technical and storytelling aspects.
- Record clean, professional-sounding dialogue at home using a USB microphone.
- Edit, mix, and export professional, Internet-ready original podcasts.
- Navigate the basic functions of recording and editing software.
- Upload and create an original podcast feed using podcast aggregators.
- Demonstrate a basic understanding of the mechanics behind how sound works,

Watch Lynda.com Audacity Tutorial: **Up and Running with Audacity - 3. Basic Editing and 4. Common Tasks** (This section covers installing the LAME MP3 encoder)

Create your first podcast! **Podcast #1** should be 24bit, 48KHz - MONO.

Record **one minute** of dialogue with yourself as the talent. The topic is anything you'd like it to be. The goal is to get familiar with recording in your program of choice, your USB Microphone, editing, and delivery.

Export your first podcast as an MP3 at 128kbps and upload to the **Podcast #1 Dropbox** on D2L. Your file **MUST** be an MP3 - No Audacity project files (or other audio program files) accepted. **PLEASE NAME YOUR PODCAST "LASTNAME_FIRSTNAME_PODCAST1"**. Points will be deducted for not following this format.

Upload a short video (can be iDevice or computer quality) of yourself with your microphone. Make sure to demonstrate proper positioning and proper protection from plosives (by using a windscreen). Please make sure to say (and show) the brand and model of your microphone in your video. Please upload this to the **Microphone Video Dropbox** folder on D2L. **PLEASE NAME YOUR VIDEO "LASTNAME_FIRSTNAME_MICVIDEO"**. Points will be deducted for not following this format.

Paper #3 (750 word minimum)

Choose a podcast of your choice and listen to at least three episodes. **Each episode must be at least 15 minutes long**. Define its functions, content parameters, use of creative expression, length, audio quality and audience. Does it need improvement? How and why? Does it serve its audience? How and why? Does the narrative flow naturally? Is it long enough or is it too long? What makes this podcast unique among other podcasts in its genre (sports, comedy, news, storytelling, tech etc.) Why did you choose this podcast? **PLEASE MAKE SURE TO LIST THE THREE EPISODES YOU CHOOSE IN YOUR PAPER. FAILURE TO DO SO WILL RESULT IN A FULL LETTER GRADE DEDUCTION.**

Week 4 - 10/5

Topics Covered

Audio Basics & Audacity Part 3 / Recording Exercises. Acoustics for optimal recordings. What is a self portrait?

Assignment - DUE 10/12

Record **Podcast #2**. Podcast #2 should be 24bit, 48KHz - MONO. If you use music, it will likely be imported as stereo - this is fine. Make sure your dialogue is MONO.

Record and edit a three minute self-portrait. You are free to use music and/or sound effects (SFX) if you so choose.

Export your podcast as an MP3 at 128kbps and upload to the **Podcast #2 Dropbox** on D2L. Your file **MUST** be an MP3 - No Audacity project files (or other audio program files) accepted. **PLEASE NAME YOUR PODCAST "LASTNAME_FIRSTNAME_PODCAST2"**. Points will be deducted for not following this format.

Paper #4 (500 word minimum)

Podcast #3 plan: What will be the content of the podcast? Who is your intended audience? How long will it be? How many people will participate? How will you use music to set the tone of your podcast? What will your introductory music sound like? Will the credit music mirror the introductory music?

Note: This paper does not have to be in a narrative format. It can be lists, bullet points, or whatever format will help you organize your thoughts when preparing to record your podcast.

Week 5 - 10/12

Topics Covered

Podcast creation and delivery. What is RSS? Metadata? How do I upload to my audio server? MP3 resolutions.

Assignment - DUE 10/19

Record **Podcast #3**. Podcast #3 should be 24bit, 48KHz - MONO. If you use music, it will likely be imported as stereo - this is fine. Make sure your dialogue is MONO.

Record at least 3 minutes with introductory music, credit music, and good fades. You are free to use music and/or sound effects (SFX) if you so choose. This podcast is free to follow a topic and format of your choosing.

Export your podcast as an MP3 at 128kbps and upload to the **Podcast #3 Dropbox** on D2L. Your file **MUST** be an MP3 - No Audacity project files (or other audio program files) accepted. **PLEASE NAME YOUR PODCAST "LASTNAME_FIRSTNAME_PODCAST3"**. Points will be deducted for not following this format.

Week 6 - 10/19 - MIDTERM

Topics Covered

Listen to Self Portraits. Digital media rights and responsibilities. Royalty free music. Music editing basics.

Paper #5 (750 word minimum)

Current trends in Digital Media legalities. The topic is of your choosing. Examples: The current state of the RIAA and P2P networks, copyright fair use, domain name disputes, music law (there are many subcategories), podcasts and the FCC, the First Amendment and podcasts, Podcast guest waivers, etc. These are very broad topics and need to be narrowed down for an effective 750 word paper.

Post the topic that you chose for Paper #5 and let everyone know *why*. Share one interesting thing you learned from researching and writing the paper.

Week 7 - 10/26

Topics Covered

Social Media and sound. Listen to and critique selection of student podcasts.

Assignment - DUE 11/2

Record **Podcast #4**. Podcast #4 should be 24bit, 48KHz - MONO. If you use music, it will likely be imported as stereo - this is fine. Make sure your dialogue is MONO.

Record at least 3 minutes with introductory music, credit music, and good fades. You are free to use music and/or sound effects (SFX) if you so choose. Make sure you edit out extraneous noises - ums, clicks, pops, etc., and make sure you use good fades for your intro and outro music.

The topic of **Podcast #4** is up to you. This podcast **must** have someone else join your podcast though. The role of this other person is entirely up to you - it can be a co-host, interviewee, etc. Make sure you account for 2 people speaking if using one microphone (this is not an excuse for poor sound / bad placement - editing is your friend here if using a single microphone).

Export your podcast as an MP3 at 128kbps and upload to the **Podcast #4 Dropbox** on D2L. Your file **MUST** be an MP3 - No Audacity project files (or other audio program files) accepted. **PLEASE NAME YOUR PODCAST "LASTNAME_FIRSTNAME_PODCAST4"**. Points will be deducted for not following this format.

Week 8 - 11/2

Topics Covered

Working with Keynote and Powerpoint. How music and sound effects inform the visual narrative. How to most effectively use your voice to record a podcast.

Paper #6 (500 word minimum)

Podcast #5 Plan (Final Project): What will be the content of the podcast? Who is your intended audience? How long will it be? How many people will participate? How will you use music to set the tone of your podcast? What will your introductory music sound like? Will the credit music mirror the introductory music? Note: This paper does not have to be in a narrative format. It can be lists, bullet points, or whatever format will help you organize your thoughts when preparing to record your podcast.

Podcast #5 is DUE 11/23 - Finals Week (Week 11). This project is worth 20% of your grade so please use the time effectively to create something great! Content and professional editing are key on this project. Along with content and editing, the following is required for your project:

- 24bit, 48KHz project setting
- Correct and complete Metadata on export (Track Title, Artist, Album, Genre)
- Mono or Stereo Track
- Proper microphone used
- 128kbps MP3 Delivery

Podcast #5 is DUE 11/23 - Finals Week (Week 11). This project is worth 20% of your grade so please use the time effectively to create something great! Content and professional editing are key on this project. Along with content and editing, the following is required for your project:

- 24bit, 48KHz project setting
- Correct and complete Metadata on export (Track Title, Artist, Album, Genre)
- Mono or Stereo Track
- Proper microphone used
- 128kbps MP3 Delivery
