Description:

This is the second of a two-course sequence in which students revise and polish the first draft of their thesis screenplay. This script is to serve as the culminating piece in the MFA writing portfolio, and must be approved by a vote of the thesis committee for degree conferral.

Required Reading:

Screenwriting 101 by Film Crit Hulk (Amazon)

Objectives:

- Students will apply a successful rewrite process to their work
- Interpret notes and design a rewrite plan to address those notes
- Create professional deadline-driven script revisions
- Demonstrate mastery of cinematic writing style and narrative technique
- Employ a professional writing pace
- Operate effectively within the environment of a professional writer's room
- Evaluate others' script revisions objectively, comprehensively, and with tact

Outcomes:

- A complete revision plan
- A complete script revision plus a polish
- Delivery of the revised draft of the thesis screenplay
 - **NOTE:** The revised and polished second draft will be due to committee members by the end of day **March 18th**.

Finished, revised thesis scripts due to committees by MARCH 18th at 6 PM.

Procedures:

Classes may include lectures but will always feature a workshop session. It is *vital* important that all students submit work on time, and that all students **pre-read** the material thoroughly before class to offer detailed notes. As we have a great deal to accomplish, we will need to be efficient and effective in our discussions. We will focus on macro-level notes in class. Minor notes will be handed or sent to each writer, from each writer, in each and every class.

I want to know that you read the material by the way in which you discuss it. If I suspect you didn't read it, I will ask to see your notes.

Beginning week 4, students will be divided into two groups to maximize attention on the greatest amount of material possible. Look under "Groups" on D2L.

Beginning Week 3, work must be submitted to D2L by midnight on Sunday. We need two days of reading time. If it is not delivered on time, it cannot be critiqued.

Software:

Final Draft is the industry standard and provides functions that will be useful in this class. You should own it and be using it by now. We can get you a discount. That said, I prefer all work be delivered in PDF format all the time.

Grading:

Your weekly writing amounts to 20% of your final grade. We will review your progress at the midterm, but if you are concerned before then, please ask.

Participation is absolutely crucial. It will account for 20% of your final grade. This means reading the material, contributing with great notes, and maintaining a positive, supportive attitude in the room.

Your completed and approved rewrite plan will serve as the midterm and represents 10% of your grade.

The completed screenplay is worth 50%. Execution accounts for 25% -- is it finished and how good is it? Effort accounts for the other 25% -- how committed are you?

Late work will not be accepted. A = 100-93, A- = 92-90, B+ = 89-88, B = 87-83, B- = 82-80, C+ = 79-78, C = 77-73, C- = 72-70, D+ = 69-68, D = 67-63, D- = 62-60, F = 59-0.

C- is the minimum passing grade in this class.

Attendance:

Tardiness and absences are counterproductive to your goal of becoming a great writer and my goal of being a great teacher. Contact me ASAP if you will be late or absent. Unapproved absences forfeit an entire letter grade.

Decorum:

We must respect each other, our collaboration and the work at hand. Be truthful but sensitive when giving notes. Be prepared to solve problems instead of just pointing them out. Personal attacks and disruptive actions will not be tolerated.

Laptops:

Professional writers do not sit in meetings staring at a screen. They talk to each other and their employers/colleagues. If your computer and the mind attached to it drift away from class and I so much as suspect you of online activities not related to the task at hand, you will lose laptop privileges for the entire semester.
