Summary: The goal of this course is to enable students to identify, define, interpret and explain what narrative visuals communicate. Students will apply this knowledge to create structured visuals for projects that meaningfully and purposefully engage the viewer.

- To understand and express design concepts within 2D visual works
- To identify and understand visual components used in photography and cinema
- To create visual designs that employ visual components
- To apply visual designs to original photographic and cinematic productions

Course Lectures/Reading Assignments: The assigned readings offer an opportunity for independent learning that supplements the lectures. Lectures will introduce material not available in the readings, and the readings will explore concepts not mentioned in class. Exams/Quizzes will cover both lecture and reading materials as specified by the instructor.

Examinations: Students who do not take exams during the regularly scheduled time will receive a failing grade for the exam unless they have contacted the instructor in advance to arrange for a make-up exam. Make-up exams will be administered by the College according to its make-up exam schedule.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory. An absence is defined as not showing up for class, or showing up more than 15 minutes after class has started. All absences will result in a reduction of the attendance/participation grade. Three absences, whether excused or not, may constitute failure for the course.

Class Participation: Student participation will be measured in several ways. Students are encouraged to ask questions and offer comments relevant to the class topics. Questions will be posed to the class; students are encouraged to offer answers, insights and best guesses. Having your files, devices and making the most of class time add towards these points. Productive critiques of your own and everyone else’s work is critical. For group projects, each individual is expected to contribute according to the needs of the group/project. Peer evaluations will afford

each group the opportunity to measure the contributions of each individual.

Attitude: A professional and academic attitude is expected throughout this course. Measurable examples of non-academic or unprofessional attitude include: talking to others when someone is speaking, mocking another's opinion, cell phones ringing/vibrating, emailing, etc. Out of respect to fellow students and the professor, texting and other forms of technological socializing is not allowable in class. If any issues arise a student may be asked to leave the classroom.

Cell Phones/On Call: If you bring a cell phone to class, it must be off or set to a silent mode. Should you need to answer a call during class, leave the room in an undistruptive manner. If you are required to be on call as part of your job, please advise me at the start of the course.
