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**description**

ISM 101: Introduction to user experience design is an immersion in contemporary design theory and practice.

Students will gain empathy for the user by identifying, navigating, and investigating elements of user experience design in real life. Students will gain agency by gathering information, sensemaking, creating user experiences, and observing the results of these efforts/creations.

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**learning outcomes**

+ Students will be able to identify, navigate, investigate, and analyze elements and principles of user experience design. + Students will be able to identify opportunities for empathy as an approach to design research. + Students will be able to generate user experience design ideas for research and development. + Students will be able to develop a vocabulary for user experience and user experience design. + Students will recognize code as the material underlying interaction design. + Students will be able to address social, ethical, and user-centered concerns related to visual communication and user experience design.

This course involves 2 major projects (50 points each), for a total of 100 points. To receive credit for the 2 major projects students must be prepared for class and have work posted to D2L Discussions on time.

Project criteria may include evidence of: care, research, concept, craft, engagement. For example:

10 points possible: care [attention to project guidelines, timeliness with posting, naming files/posts and project attribution]

10 points possible: research [use and production of research]

10 point possible: concept [thoughtful conceptual dimension]

10 points possible: craft [visual design with purpose and intent]

10 point possible: engagement [engagement in learning, sharing, transformation, reflection]

**Students are welcome and encouraged to go above and beyond expectations.**

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**grades**

Project points will be averaged for a final grade.

A = 90-100 / B = 80-89 / C = 70-79 / D = 60-69 / F = 0-59
