

FILM 100 - Introduction to Cinema - Summer Session II - Brian Mellen

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Office hours: F 12:00pm to 1:30pm (Zoom)

Course Description:

This lecture-based course will introduce students to the art of cinema from the point of view of the filmmaker. Through screenings of contemporary and classic films, students will gain an appreciation of the various crafts involved in the making of movies, such as: acting, directing, producing, screenwriting, cinematography, production design, editing, sound, or visual effects. This course is not intended for students who plan to major or minor in Digital Cinema. No prerequisites.

Learning Domain Description:

Film 100 Introduction to Cinema: The Art of Making Movies is included in the Liberal Studies program as a course with credit in the Arts and Literature domain. Courses in the Arts and Literature domain ask students to extend their knowledge and experience of the arts while developing their critical and reflective abilities.

In these courses, students interpret and analyze particular creative works, investigate the relations of form and meaning, and through critical and/or creative activity, come to better understand the original audience that witnessed a work of art and how its meaning and significance changes over time. These courses focus on works of art or literature, however the process of analysis may include social, cultural, and historical issues. Genres covered in this domain include literature, the visual arts, media arts, the performing arts, music, and theater.

Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- Understand and discuss film as an artistic medium.
- Analyze and discuss the craft and technique of specific members of the filmmaking process (i.e. cinematographer, editor, writer, etc.).
- Analyze and discuss visual communication and storytelling as used by filmmakers.

Learning outcomes will be achieved through in-class discussions and exercises as well as writing assignments that will require students to think critically and analyze a specific aspect of filmmaking in a given film. Students are expected to write 6 pages this quarter in accordance with the Arts and Literature domain requirement.

Papers:

There will be three, two-page analysis papers throughout the quarter. All homework must be submitted via D2L on the Submissions page. The folders where you submit your assignments close automatically so no late work will be accepted. Don't submit your work last minute or you risk not being able to submit. **Emailed submissions will not be accepted.**

Quizzes:

There will be five quizzes throughout the quarter. All quizzes will be administered through D2L. They will close promptly at the appointed time. You will not be able to access or submit quizzes that are in progress once the deadline passes.

You must finish the film screenings and the readings BEFORE doing the quizzes as the quizzes cover readings, screenings, and lecture material.

Electronic Devices (In-Person Only):

There is a no tolerance policy on electronic device usage during class. Cell phone/tablet usage and/or internet usage during class will result in 0 attendance points for the day. It is distracting to others around you. You may take notes on a computer using word or text edit (do not browse the internet) but not on a cellphone/tablet.

Cell Phones/On Call:

If you have a cell phone to class, it must be off or set to a silent mode. Should you need to answer a call during class, students must leave the room or mute your computer's microphone in a non-disruptive manner. Out of respect to fellow students and the professor, texting is never allowable in class. If you are required to be on call as part of your job, please advise me at the start of the course.

Student responsibilities:

Each student is responsible for their time management and for meeting the expectations in the syllabus. The instructor is not responsible for reminding students of assignment deadlines in class. In the event of an absence, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor for an assignment sheet detailing any homework. If an assignment is listed on the syllabus you are still responsible for completing the assignment on time.

Attendance & Participation:

This course demands class participation - attendance is mandatory. More than one (1) unexcused absence will result in a full letter reduction to your grade. Each subsequent absence will also be a letter grade reduction. Three unexcused absences will result in FAILURE of the course.

Excuse absences must be worked out with instructor BEFORE the absence.

Course Lectures/Reading Assignments:

Readings are due for the next class session unless otherwise noted. Please keep up or it will be hard to follow in-class demos and lectures.

Lecture presentations will occur weekly. The readings offer an opportunity for independent learning that supplements lectures. The instructor will use both the classroom and the readings for quiz questions. Lectures may introduce additional material not available in the readings, and the readings may explore concepts not mentioned in class. **BOTH SOURCES ARE NEEDED.**

Discussion Posts:

Every week you are required to post at least once and reply to at least two other students week-to-week on D2L. Discussion posts add an important interactive component to the online section of the course. **The in-person section is also required to post.**

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be given on lectures in class throughout the quarter. Quizzes will be multiple choice and true/false.

Deadlines:

This course requires strict adherence to deadlines, therefore late assignments will not be accepted for grading and written feedback will be given at the instructors discretion. **You will not be eligible for an A in the class unless you turn in all assignments on time.**
